
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

In spring 2020, the Horta Museum will immerse itself in the creative processes of late 19th century artists and architects. It will exhibit over 80 drawings (61 of them previously unpublished) by designers such as William Morris, Henry van de Velde, Josef Hoffmann, and Charles Rennie Mackintosh. The works in question, all designs for fabric or wallpaper, will be displayed as a large fresco—a kind of herbarium—of motifs and decorative ornaments. Every stage of the creative process will be illustrated, from the first pencil-stroke to the finished work.


At the same time, the room originally occupied by Horta's team of draughtsmen will be opened up permanently to the public, providing the perfect opportunity for a display of metalwork and casts, 60 in all, that give a sense both of Horta's approach to ornament and of his method of working. Stepping into these painstakingly restored and adapted surroundings, visitors will find themselves at the very heart of the building that was creative home to the master of Art Nouveau.

OPENING OF THE DRAWING STUDIO

We should not forget that what is now the Horta Museum was not just the great architect's private residence but also his studio. It was therefore in this building that his many architectural projects took shape. From his private study, sketches were dispatched to the drawing studio, where a dozen or so young architects-in-the-making scaled them to size. The drawings were then sent down to the basement, where sculptors made casts of them. The casts were dispatched, without further modification, to the various craftsmen, to ensure faithful execution of the designs. Casts were made of almost every detail—door-handles, column heads, chair-backs.

THE CASTS

The Museum is currently home to an extraordinary long-term loan: a collection of almost 500 casts rescued by Jean Delhayé after the death of Victor Horta and subsequently deposited here by the Art & History Museum in Brussels. When the studio became a museum, the second floor remained closed and was used as a storage area. Now, however, thanks to a highly innovative display-system, the casts can be preserved and protected whilst allowing the public to view a selection of the finest pieces—to get a glimpse, in effect, of Horta at work.



A RENEWED SETTING

In this area, the exhibition aims to strike as even a balance as possible between heritage, aesthetics, and education. As well as introducing the public to Horta's way of working, taking them from initial sketch through to finished product, it will present them with a repertoire of forms favoured by the architect and, finally, bring in other buildings, comparing designs, casts, and finished works.

Architecturally speaking, the large glazed bay of the drawing studio is particularly eye-catching from outside. This room, facing north and with a very high ceiling, offered ideal conditions for the work of scaling up Horta's sketches. That said, it was also a place where discipline was expected: Horta had the windows fitted with hammered glass to stop the draughtsmen being distracted by events outside. It is still as luminous a spot as ever, where visitors can either go with the flow of Horta's lines and curves or learn more about the great architect's work.
